Congratulations to the Civil and Mechanical Engineering Departments for receiving official accreditation notice from the Engineering Accreditation Commission of ABET. ABET accreditation assures that our programs meet standards to produce graduates ready to enter critical technical fields leading the way in innovation and emerging technologies and anticipating the public's welfare and safety needs.

ABET noted that Tech's Civil Engineering program features strong industry collaborations and incorporates industry professionals into the curriculum. Students are prepared to graduate with industry connections and experience.

ABET acknowledged the Mechanical Engineering Department's strengths are the faculty with their extensive industry experience and high-quality, top-tier research labs. Students are prepared to succeed in professional practice and have unique pathways to graduate programs.

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Faculty and students from the Precision Machining Program at Highlands College provided parts that will head to NASA's International Space Station on SpaceX 21. SpaceX 21 is a

commercial resupply service mission to the International Space Station slated for this November. NASA contracted the mission that will be flown by SpaceX.

Our faculty and students produced a one-handed tape dispenser and a seat track attachment from NASA's blueprints and materials. The parts were then created on the Hass CNC machines in the Machine Shop at Highlands. Tolerances for the parts as specified by NASA were exceeded by the machining process. All measurements were checked and verified for each part on the shop's CMM machine and were completed before the due date.

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Thank you to all who took part in this year's giving event, DayOne, on the 10th and 11th of September. DayOne celebrates Montana Tech's history and future. It is an opportunity for our students, departments, programs, clubs, and initiatives to raise funds in focused areas.

This year's event raised nearly \$200,000 over two days from 726 donors. These numbers represent a 21% increase in dollars raised and a 73% increase in our 2019 event participation. It's also important to note that this year featured over \$44,000 in matched funds for our DayOne projects provided by private donors. Thank you to all who participated in DayOne 2020. We look forward to celebrating next year!

Our men's and women's golf teams recently completed their most successful fall season in the school's history. The men's team won 3-out-of-the-4 Frontier Conference tournaments this fall and won the Frontier Conference season title for the first time ever. The Orediggers had three different players earn individual titles in Trey Hoagland, Sean Ramsbacher, and Brady Cady. Montana Tech will have three first team all-conference performers and two players on the second team. Montana Tech's women's team placed a pair of ladies on the all-conference team with Tanna Campbell on the First Team and Skyler Martin on the second team.







The Montana Tech cross country team has established itself as a solid program in just their first year competing. The team placed third at the Frontier Conference Rumble hosted by Carroll College in September. Senior transfer Becca Richtman placed first in the women's race. Both men's and women's teams took third at the Frontier Conference Preview Meet on September 11 in Havre. Richtman won the women's field, and freshman Averi Parker finished in sixth

place. The men's team was led by Ian Barville, who placed eighth.

Last week, Richtman was named the NAIA Women's National Runner of the Week after breaking her school record at the Frontier Conference Rumble. She also received the Frontier Conference Women's Runner of the Week.

Next up, the team will compete at the Rocky Mountain College Invitational on October 9.
