

### FRONTIER CONFERENCE CHAMPS



Congratulations to the Montana Tech men's basketball team on back-to-back Frontier Conference championships. The Orediggers defeated the University of Providence 103-95 in a thrilling championship game at the Four Seasons Arena in Great Falls, MT.

The championship game saw Asa Williams getting the momentum going hitting back-to-back threes in the opening minutes and had his third before five minutes had passed. Williams finished the half with 12 points going 3 for 5 from beyond the arc. Williams finished with 23 points shooting 58.3% from the field and 5 for 8 from three-point range. Williams also led the Orediggers with eight rebounds.

Three more Orediggers hit double-digits in the first half. Caleb Bellach netted 11 going 2 for 4 from long. Hayden Diekhans went 5 for 5 from the field and Michael Ure went 5 for 6 as they both finished with 10 points each.

Tech slowed the Argos charge and created some space getting the lead back up to nine after Bridger Larson made a layup with 11:30 left in the game. Tech was able to hold off Providence's advances in the final ten minutes. Larson had 10 of his 14 points in the second half.

The Orediggers had seven in double-digits by the end of the game. The Tech bench had 37 points.

Bellach finished with 15 points, three rebounds, and three assists. Diekhans had 12 points and five boards.

Keeley Bake shot 4 for 5 from beyond the arc finishing with 12 points and five assists. Camdyn LaRance had 11 points and six rebounds.

The last time the Orediggers won back-to-back tournaments was in 1998 and 1999. There was only one other time the Orediggers won both regular season and tournament titles two years in a row. The 1983-84 and 1984-85 teams under head coach Kelvin Sampson won both back-to-back.

The Orediggers road to the NAIA National Championship begins tonight when they take on No. 13 Westmont in first round action beginning at 7:00 pm in the HPER. We need all faculty, staff, and students to be there to cheer on the Diggers! Faculty and students get in free.

# DANIELSON SELECTED FOR FULBRIGHT IN HUNGARY

Congratulations to Dr. Chris Danielson for being selected for a Fulbright award to Hungary during the academic year 2023-2024. The presidentially appointed 12-member board supervises the Fulbright Program worldwide and approves the selection of all Fulbright recipients. According to the board, Danielson's appointment reflects his leadership and contributions to society. The Fulbright is made possible through funds appropriated annually by the U.S. Congress and, in many cases, by contributions from partner countries and private parties.

Danielson will lecture at the University of Pécs in the institution's Department of Literatures and Cultures in English on U.S. history



and his areas of specialization in U.S. race relations, the civil rights movement, and U.S. foreign policy.

In 2021, Danielson received a Fulbright Award to Russia to teach at the University of Tyumen, but this award was not finalized due to the present state of U.S.-Russian relations.

# MONTANA TECH TEAMS COMPETE IN CONSTRUCTION COMPETITION

Three teams from Montana Technological University competed in the 2023 Associated Schools of Construction (ASC) Region 6/7 annual Construction Bidding Competition in Sparks, Nevada. Montana Tech entered a team in the following categories: Heavy Civil, Preconstruction, and Project Management.

The university's Heavy Civil team placed 3rd in the competition. The team was comprised of six seniors studying civil engineering. The team trained through the fall semester, focusing on learning various methods to construct heavy civil projects.



The team had only one individual, Brandon Quinn, with past competition experience. Quinn, the 2023 team captain, competed in the 2022 competition as an alternate, and his team placed 2nd. The Heavy Civil team members have various construction experiences through summer internships. The competition included 15 teams from Rocky Mountain region universities, including Montana State, Colorado State, Northern University of Arizona (1st place), Brigham Young University (2nd place), and the University of Alaska. The Montana Tech team included Chip Anderson, Willie Anderson, Beau Drivdahl, Cody Gagnon, Brandon Quinn, and Ashley Patera. Adjunct Sonya Rosenthal coached the team and expressed pride in how quickly the team learned and applied learnings from workshops and presentations from industry and coursework to solve their competition problems. The team was given two Kiewitsponsored problems of replacing a steel tank with a concrete tank in Hawaii and then repairing a marine structure on Waikiki beach.

# JOHN RAY HAS PAPER ACCEPTED FOR PRESENTATION



Dr. John W. Ray of Montana Tech's Interdisciplinary Arts and Sciences Department has had a peer reviewed paper entitled "The Decline of Political Institutions: Extent, Causes and Remedies" accepted for presentation next spring at the Sixteenth International Conference on Climate Change: Impacts and Responses to be held at and sponsored by the Ecole Superieure de Commerce de Pau, Pau, France. The paper examines the extent to which democratic institutions, which have a proclivity to respond to immediate issues, can mitigate climate change that is perceived to be of somewhat distant concern.
